Cotton Polyester pique fabric - Poloshirts (DL 409/DL412)

Fabric Construction : 60% cotton, 40% polyester

The superb weight and density of our poloshirts means the durability, comfort and look of the garment are maintained over its life providing all the care instructions are followed. The advice we have is below:

WASHING

- Always wash at 40°C. Higher temperatures may cause shrinkage or affect the colour or weaken the fibres. Wash dark colours separately. Avoid strong fabric conditioners as they can break the fibres.

SHRINKAGE

- Even though this is cotton polyester, it still needs re-shaping whilst damp for best results. The poloshirt will return to its' original shape every time if you fold it lengthways twice, hold the top in one hand and the bottom in the other, then pull back in to shape. It's simple and it works!

DRYING

- If it is tumble dried too hot for too long, it will damage the garment. Take extra care when using this method of drying.

IRONING

- Use an iron with steam. Never iron directly on to print.

100% Cotton pique poloshirt fabric (DL 401)

Fabric Construction : 100% cotton

This is a fabric that performs with wear, it absorbs perspiration and feels comfortable at all times. Because of the density of the knit, this poloshirt is also excellent for embroidered badges. If cared for correctly this performance will continue with every wear.

WASHING

- Always wash at 40°C, high temperatures will fade cotton fabric. Wash dark colours separately to avoid any loose dye transfer.

SHRINKAGE

- As cotton is a natural fibre it needs reshaping before it is ironed. The poloshirt will return to its original shape every time if you fold it lengthways twice, hold the top in one hand and the bottom in the other then pull back to shape. It's simple and it works.

DRYING

- If the garment is tumble dried too hot for too long, it will damage the fibres. Take extra care when using this method of drying.

IRONING

- Use an iron with steam to bring the soft feel back. Never iron directly on to print.
